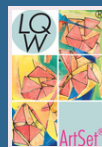

MORE THAN ONE DEMOCRACY

Since the development of the Betzavta method and the publication of the Betzavta handbook in Germany, the Adam Institute for Democracy and Peace in Jerusalem has expanded the method's basic concept in various directions and adapted it to changing realities and new developments.

This English-language training course offers participants an opportunity to become familiar with these developments and to learn directly from the developer of the Betzavta method, co-founder and Director of the Adam Institute for Democracy and Peace in Jerusalem, Dr. Uki Maroshek-Klarman.

The course is intended for Betzavta facilitators working in Germany and in other countries, as well as for interested participants who wish to become acquainted with the method and its unique educational approach.

The main focus of this year's training is on the challenges facing democracies, as reflected in various processes of erosion and retreat from democratic principles in Europe and around the world. Similar developments can be observed in Germany and other European countries, as well as in Israel and the United States, providing rich material for discussion and learning.

The transition from democracy to authoritarian forms of government, sometimes incorporating features of modern fascism, appears to be taking place gradually in some contexts and rapidly in others.

These developments require those engaged in democracy education to revisit both familiar and new questions, including ways of addressing the "tyranny of the majority," the meaning and limits of "defensive democracy," the limits of obedience, and related issues. They also require educators to consider how these questions should be incorporated into educational practice.

Betzavta facilitators must therefore ask themselves what these developments mean for their work with the Betzavta method for democracy education:

Are we ourselves facing a dilemma regarding the principle of transforming conflicts into dilemmas? In the present reality, should we take a clearer and more decisive position?

War will also be a central topic of discussion. The seminar will provide an opportunity to examine the situation in Israel/Palestine with Uki Maroshek-Klarman from the perspective of an Israeli peace activist, and in dialogue with her colleague Saber Rabi, from the perspective of a Palestinian peace activist.
